Over the last 2 years, this column in the DPOA newsletter included 24 separate articles about the American flag. Beginning with this issue, this article will feature the men and women of the United States military...those who are currently defending our freedom and those who are veterans and have served in the past.

The Congress of the Confederation created the United States Army (USA) on June 14, 1775. The United States Congress created the United States Navy (USN) on March 27, 1794, and the United States Marine Corp (USMC) was created on July 11, 1798. All three trace their origins to their respective Continental predecessors.

The Coast Guard was created on January 28, 1915, by the merger of the United States Revenue Cutter Service and the United States Lifesaving Service with roots to the early days of the Republic.

Initially formed as a part of the United States Army on August 1, 1907, the United States Air Force (USAF) with the passing of the National Security Act of 1947 was established as a separate branch of the U.S. Armed Forces on September 18, 1947. The United States Space Force (USSF) was founded December 20, 2019, and is organized and managed under the civilian-led Department of the Air Force.

There are many veterans and veteran's spouses who are members of Diamante Members Club. As a result, we thought it might be interesting for you to see the current pay rates for our military personnel. The figures in the tables below and on page 5 are BASIC PAY for the first 8 years of service. Fortunately, the rate of pay for the military officers and enlisted personnel continues to increase, with extra payments provided for housing, medical, and other expenses. Simply stated, our military deserves all of our support.

Reporting Suspicious Activities

Our Neighborhood Crime Watch

What is a suspicious activity? Often, residents are confused about what they should report and why. After reviewing this article, our Neighborhood Watch volunteers and Diamante property owners will know the appropriate who, what, when, where, and how of reporting a suspicious activity.

Often, residents ask, “Why should I get involved?” or “How am I going to benefit from reporting a suspicious activity?” Although the answers to these questions may seem obvious, it must be clearly communicated that residents are essential components in protecting their community. Because residents receive mixed signals about when and what to report, it is important to first define “suspicious activity.”

A suspicious activity can refer to any event, individual, or activity that seems unusual or out of place.

Some examples include:

- ❑ A stranger loitering in your neighborhood, or a vehicle repeatedly cruising the streets;
- ❑ Someone peering into cars or into the windows of a residence;
- ❑ A high volume of traffic going to and coming from a home on a daily basis;
- ❑ Someone loitering around the clubhouse, golf course, or a secluded area;
- ❑ Strange odors coming from a house, clubhouse, or vehicle;
- ❑ Open or broken doors and/or windows at an unoccupied residence;
- ❑ Someone tampering with electrical, gas, or sewer systems without an identifiable company vehicle;
- ❑ Persons arriving or leaving from homes in your neighborhood at unusual hours;
- ❑ Multiple persons who appear to be working in unison and exhibiting suspicious behaviors; and
- ❑ Signs of forced entry or tampering with security or safety systems.



REMEMBER

Residents serve as only the extra “eyes and ears” of law enforcement and should report their observations of suspicious activities to their Block Captains. Residents should never try to take action on those observations. Trained law enforcement officers should be the only ones to ever take action.

When you call to report a suspicious person or activity, you not only help the police, but you will also make your community a safer place to live. Some people may notice a suspicious activity and hesitate to call for fear of being labeled a “nosy neighbor.” Still others assume that someone else has already called. Simply stated, police officers will not know there is a problem unless they are told. ♦

SCOTT AND KIM FINNELL

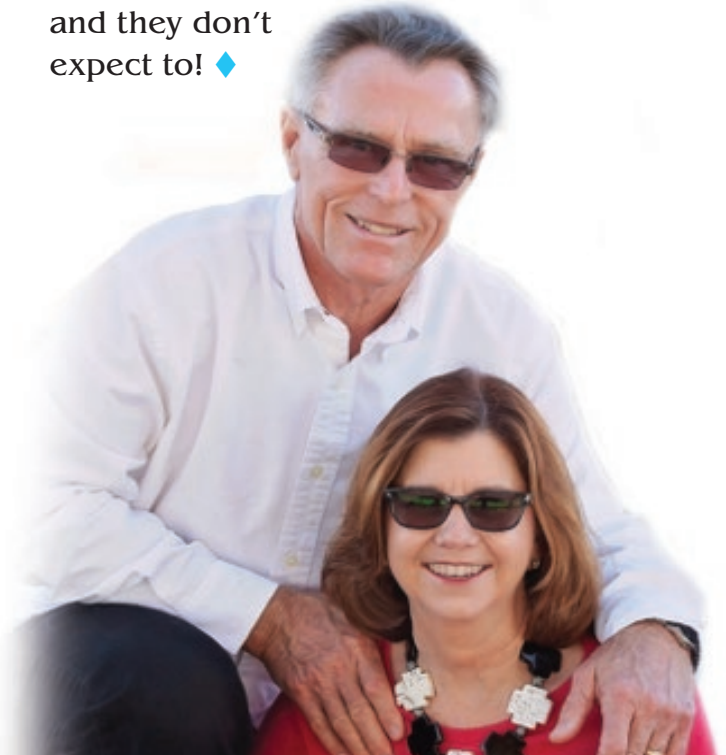
